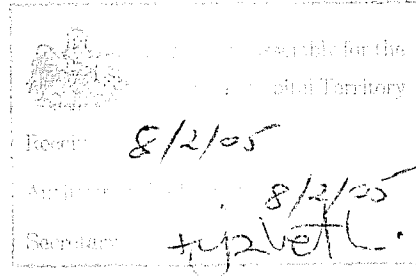

Standing Committee on Planning & Environment – Comments on DV205 and DV237

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the above proposals. I do so as both Chief Executive officer of John James Memorial Hospital but also as a local resident in Deakin.

DV205 – Oasis Development

John James Memorial Hospital has a vision for the West Deakin area being a focal point for acute, sub acute and recreational health activities.

Accordingly we strongly support the development of modern medical consultant suites, treatment facilities, allied health services and recreational health facilities in the vicinity of the John James Memorial Hospital and Lidia Perin Memorial Hospitals.

However, we would not like to see redevelopment that does not take adequate account of disability access, pedestrian movement to nearby complementary facilities or the loss of the amenity of a swimming pool.

John James Memorial Hospital supports the retention of a swimming pool and has no objections to the development of a hydrotherapy pool to complement the sports medicine and injury management practitioners located in the area.

We would wish to ensure that such a pool has excellent access for the disabled and access for stretcher patients. This should include a readily accessible ambulating corridor to adequate disabled parking and safe road crossing points across King and Denison Streets.

The vicinity of the Alfred Deakin High School, Napier Crescent and John James Memorial Hospital/Mint area already has parking issues and it is important that a comprehensive parking study is undertaken by the developer. Certainly current parking in the area would be inadequate for the proposed development.

John James Memorial Hospital would of course not be happy to see more than a 30% occupancy of the Deakin Oasis site for general office use other than medical, health or related services that promote a healthy life style.
