- (d) in 2023, the theme for World Day for Safety and Health at Work was “A safe and healthy working environment is a fundamental principle and right at work”, focusing on good work; work that is not only safe, but that is also good for us by contributing to our physical and psychological health and wellbeing; and
 - (e) in 2023, the theme for Workers’ Memorial Day was “remember the dead, fight for the living”; and
 - (2) express solidarity in reflecting on the importance of World Day for Safety and Health at Work and International Workers’ Memorial Day which occurred on 28 April 2023 by:
 - (a) formally recording a continuing and shared commitment to being a world-leading jurisdiction in work health and safety; and
 - (b) continuing to provide Territory workers with contemporary laws that recognise the complexity of modern workplaces and emerging hazards and keep pace with community expectations.

- *2 **MS CASTLEY:** To move—That this Assembly:
 - (1) notes:
 - (a) the statement by the Minister for Health, Rachel Stephen-Smith, in 2021, in relation to emergency department (ED) wait times that “Our target – and the national target – is 70 per cent. We are nowhere near that at this point in time. We want to get to that target within nine months.”;
 - (b) according to the Productivity Commission’s Report on Government Services for Health, in 2022-23 the ACT was again among the worst jurisdictions for ED wait times;
 - (c) only 51 percent of ED patients were treated within clinically recommended wait times, well under the national average of 65 percent, and only marginally up on the 2021-22 figure of 48 percent;

- (d) the ACT performed the worst of all jurisdictions on measures of patients' length of time in the ED, with only 47.9 percent of patients staying for four hours or less, compared to a national average of 55.8 percent;
 - (e) the ACT was also the worst jurisdiction for treating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people within recommended wait times – coming in at 50 percent compared to NSW at 74 percent and a national average of 67 percent;
 - (f) the ACT was by far the worst jurisdiction for the percentage of Aboriginal and Indigenous patients spending four hours or less in the ED;
 - (g) elective surgery waiting times in the ACT also ballooned – with 30 percent of elective surgery patients in public hospitals in 2022-23 not admitted within clinically recommended times, up from 24.6 percent in 2021-22 and 15 percent in 2020-21; and
 - (h) the ACT has the lowest ratio of general practitioners to 100,000 people of any major Australian city; and
- (2) calls on the Minister for Health to fulfil her 2021 undertaking to fix ED wait times in nine months by having 70 percent of ED patients seen within clinically acceptable times. (*Notice given 5 February 2024. Notice will be removed from the Notice Paper unless called on within 4 sitting weeks – standing order 125A*).

- (1) notes:
 - (a) the Hamas attacks commencing 7 October 2023 involving the targeting and death of Israeli civilians, including women and children, the taking of hostages, and widespread rocket fire into civilian areas;
 - (b) the immense loss of life and human suffering occurring in the Gaza Strip, including that of women and children due to Israeli military action;
 - (c) these events occur in the context of ongoing occupation of the Palestinian territories, construction of illegal settlements, and the historic displacement and apartheid treatment of the Palestinian people by the State of Israel;
 - (d) that the International Court of Justice has ruled that all steps to prevent genocide in Gaza must be taken;

- (e) the impacts of the conflict and the decades of struggle are felt deeply in the ACT community; and
- (f) as a result, many communities and individuals here in Canberra:
 - (i) are facing an extremely challenging time, concerned about the safety of family, friends, and loved ones; and
 - (ii) have been subject to racist slurs and taunts based on their ethnicity or religious beliefs;
- (2) calls on all Members of this Assembly to:
 - (a) voice their support for:
 - (i) an immediate and permanent ceasefire;
 - (ii) a release of all hostages and political prisoners;
 - (iii) all perpetrators to be held accountable for their actions in accordance with international law;
 - (iv) reinstating and enhancing funding for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency; and
 - (v) ending the illegal occupation of the Palestinian territories and apartheid against the Palestinian population;
 - (b) condemn all forms of racism, including antisemitism and islamophobia, and state these have no place here in the ACT; and
 - (c) voice their support for Canberra's Palestinian and Israeli communities during this challenging time, including people seeking refuge in the ACT;
- (3) further notes:
 - (a) the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (UNOHCHR) maintains a database of companies complicit in the establishment and maintenance of illegal settlements in occupied Palestinian territories;
 - (b) as of 31 December 2023, the ACT Government held investments in the following companies listed in the UNOHCHR database:
 - (i) Airbnb Inc;
 - (ii) Alstom SA;
 - (iii) Bank Hapoalim BM;
 - (iv) Bank Leumi Le-Israel BM;
 - (v) Booking Holdings Inc;
 - (vi) Expedia Group Inc;
 - (vii) Israel Discount Bank Ltd;
 - (viii) Mizrahi Tefahot Bank Ltd; and
 - (ix) Motorola Solutions Inc; and

- (c) that the ACT Government's Responsible Investment Policy of March 2023, and its Environment, Social and Corporate Governance (ESG) controversy assessment exclusions should preclude companies listed in paragraph (3)(b) as they are complicit in the human rights violations by the State of Israel against the Palestinian people;
- (4) calls on the ACT Government to report back to the Assembly by August 2024, on divestments that have or may be undertaken, to ensure that company ESG controversy assessment exclusions fully consider companies involved in illegal settlements in Palestinian territories; and
- (5) requests that the Speaker convey to the Israeli Embassy and Palestinian General Delegation a copy of this motion on behalf of the Assembly.

*4 **MS LEE:** To move—That this Assembly:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) recent analysis by Numbeo, the world's largest cost of living database, has confirmed that Canberra has the highest cost of living in Australia;
 - (b) the cost for Canberrans to visit their general practitioner is the second highest in the country;
 - (c) Canberra remains the second most expensive city in which to rent;
 - (d) Canberra has the highest vehicle registration costs in the country;
 - (e) Canberra is the most expensive state or territory in the country for children's sport, including swimming lessons; and
 - (f) Canberra remains the second most expensive city in Australia to buy a house;
- (2) further notes:
 - (a) that Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data shows that while living costs for all household types are increasing, it is employee households (households earning wages) that have recorded the largest annual increase in living costs of all household types, with a 9.0 percent increase;
 - (b) community groups such as the ACT Council of Social Services are seeing, largely for the first time, a significant increase in people on incomes – i.e. wage earners, accessing their services; and
 - (c) the latest ABS figures show retail spending in the ACT fell 3.8 percent in December, well above the national rate of 2.7 percent, demonstrating that Canberrans are really feeling the pinch; and
- (3) calls on the ACT Labor-Greens Government to:
 - (a) explain to the people of Canberra why cost of living in the ACT is so high under their Government; and

- (b) report back to the Assembly by the last sitting day in March on measures to alleviate cost of living pressures for all Canberrans. *(Notice given 5 February 2024. Notice will be removed from the Notice Paper unless called on within 4 sitting weeks – standing order 125A).*

*5 **MS ORR:** To present a Bill for an Act to promote disability inclusion, and for other purposes. *(Notice given 2 February 2024)*

*7 **MR PARTON:** To move—That the Assembly:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) on 7 December 2023, the ACT Labor-Greens Government released their costings and the timeframe for the delivery of light rail stage 2A which included the total cost for stage 2A at \$577 million;
 - (b) the ACT Labor-Greens costings of \$577 million does not include the total cost of the work for stage 2A, specifically the cost to raise London Circuit, upgrades to the depot and purchasing more light rail vehicles;
 - (c) when including the cost for these elements of light rail stage 2A, the total cost of stage 2A balloons out to over \$800 million for an extension of just 1.7 km;
 - (d) the original timeframe for the light rail stage 2A when announced was 2024; and
 - (e) the revised timeframe is now early 2028, four years longer than first announced;
- (2) further notes that this demonstrates that the ACT Labor-Greens Government have not been upfront with ACT taxpayers over the true cost and timeframe of light rail stage 2A; and
- (3) calls on the Government to table in the Legislative Assembly by the last sitting week:
 - (a) in June 2024, the full costings, including all the enabling work, of light rail stage 2A; and
 - (b) in August 2024, the full costings and timeframe for light rail stage 2B and be upfront with Canberrans on the true cost of this major infrastructure project ahead of the 2024 ACT election. *(Notice given 5 February 2024. Notice will be removed from the Notice Paper unless called on within 4 sitting weeks – standing order 125A).*

*8 **MR PARTON:** To move—That the Assembly:

- (1) notes:
 - (a) increasing public transport patronage should be one of the key jobs of the Minister for Transport;
 - (b) pursuing policies to reduce car use and prioritise public transport are a means to tackle congestion, air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions and to create a more liveable city;
 - (c) faster public transport travel times are an enormous factor in convincing people to take public transport over the private motor vehicle;
 - (d) should stage 2B of the tram ever be completed, the travel time between Woden and Civic will be up to 15 minutes slower than the current rapid bus run, with the addition of bus to tram transfer time at Woden interchange;
 - (e) the completion of stage 2B would necessitate the cancellation of the R4 and R5 bus routes, at least between Woden and Civic, because the much quicker bus routes would be a more attractive travel option than the tram;
 - (f) public transport travel times for most southside journeys are likely to increase should stage 2B ever be completed; and
 - (g) Canberra had one of the highest percentages of public transport usage nationally in the 1980s by simply running a better-connected bus network; and
- (2) calls on the Government as a matter of urgency to:
 - (a) publicly admit that the R4 and R5 services will not continue if stage 2B of the tram is ever completed;
 - (b) publicly admit that most public transport travel times from the south will increase if stage 2B of the tram is ever completed; and
 - (c) examine ways to decrease travel times in our public transport network and report the findings back to the Assembly at the end of July 2024. *(Notice given 5 February 2024. Notice will be removed from the Notice Paper unless called on within 4 sitting weeks – standing order 125A).*
