ANSWER TO QUESTION TAKEN ON NOTICE **DURING PUBLIC HEARINGS**

Asked by Mr Doszpot on 14 March 2013 : Ms Jenny Dodd, CIT Chief Executive (Acting) took on notice the following question:

Ref: Hansard Transcript 14 March 2013 PAGE 42

In relation to: Staff employed at CIT on higher duties:—

MR DOSZPOT: I am very glad to hear about those directions, because I understand it was not always quite in that arena. I am glad that you are paying due attention to it. How many staff currently employed at the CIT do not hold required qualifications for the positions that they are currently in?

MR DOSZPOT: I would be very happy for you to take that on notice. Could you include the number and also the length of time they have been acting in those positions?

JOY BURCH MLA: The answer to the Member's question is as follows:—

As at 14 March 2013, there are currently 10 teachers on higher duties as Education Managers (TB2) and Centre Directors (TB3). All of these teachers have the appropriate qualifications.

In relation to required qualifications, the CIT Recruitment Team introduced the higher duties allowance (HDA) checklist in May 2011, which required Centre Directors to sign off that they had sighted the appropriate mandatory qualifications.

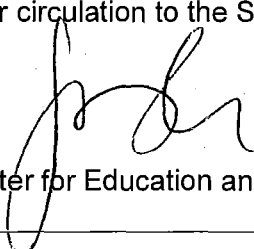
To further strengthen the higher duties checklist process, from January 2013 copies of the employees' qualifications must be attached to the HDA form in order to ensure that the employee holds the mandatory qualification requirements for the position.

The table below shows the figures and median duration for all staff on HDA, as at December 2011 and December 2012.

- 2) The number of reports relate to 261 young people who were supervised in the 2011-12 reporting year.

The age range of the 261 young people who were reported against is in the following table.

Note this includes young people on warrants that have not been finalised and therefore includes young adults who are required to be reported against until finalisation of warrants. Ages are taken as of the last day of the reporting year.

MRS JONES asked:

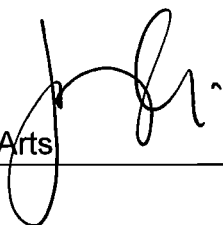
[Hearing Transcript: Education -14-03-13, p 72]
