In relation to: a proposed commission of inquiry into the overrepresentation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the ACT justice system

 - b. Can the Minister please attach copies of any that are not publicly available on the internet?

- 3. Who is performing this audit?
- 4. Has a cost for the proposed commission of inquiry been estimated in line with the originally proposed terms of reference?
 - a. If so, what is this estimated cost?
 - b. If not, why not?
 - c. Can the Minister please attach a copy of the originally proposed terms of reference for this commission of inquiry?
- 5. Are there any reasons why a commission of inquiry could not be funded through the Healing and Reconciliation Fund if this were requested by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community leaders?

RACHEL STEPHEN-SMITH MLA: The answer to the Member's question is as follows:-

- 2. When will the audit of existing reviews commence, and when is it expected to finish?

These matters have not yet been finalised. However, substantive work is currently expected to commence in 2022.

3. Who is performing this audit?

These matters have not yet been finalised. However, the audit is currently expected to involve a panel of ACT Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community leaders, supported by the Justice and Community Safety Directorate.

- 4. Has a cost for the proposed commission of inquiry been estimated in line with the originally proposed terms of reference?
 - a. If so, what is this estimated cost?
 - b. If not, why not?
 - c. Can the minister please attach a copy of the originally proposed terms of reference for this commission of inquiry?

The ACT Government has not proposed a Terms of Reference for a Royal Commission or a Commission of Inquiry. A copy of the Terms of Reference for Royal Commission proposed to the ACT Government can be found at Attachment B – Proposed Terms of Reference for Royal Commission.

Royal Commissions undertaken in other jurisdictions provide an indication for the possible cost of a Royal Commission in the ACT. However, the Government has not estimated the cost of a Royal Commission in line with these Terms of Reference.

5. Are there any reasons why a commission of inquiry could not be funded through the Healing and Reconciliation Fund if this were requested by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community leaders?

It is possible that the Healing and Reconciliation Fund could be used to fund a Commission of Inquiry, or some element(s) of such a process. However, it is anticipated that a commission of inquiry with Royal Commission powers would be a high-cost exercise and may even exceed the available unallocated funds.

Funding a commission of inquiry from the Healing and Reconciliation Fund would also limit the funding available for community priorities, such as progress toward treaty and support for healing intergenerational trauma.
