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BIMBERI HEADLINE INDICATORS REPORT

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ABOUT BIMBERI YOUTH JUSTICE CENTRE

Bimberi Youth Justice Centre (Bimberi) was designed and constructed to provide a safe and secure environment to assist children and young people to return to the community with enhanced skills and personal development and to be better able to live a non-offending lifestyle.

Bimberi is based on a school campus model with separate residential, civic and community zones to reflect the broader community, and to provide a normalised environment for up to 40 young people. Three key elements were considered in the design of Bimberi: physical structures, operating procedures, and programs for young people. Bimberi was the first youth justice facility in Australia to comply with human rights legislation.

ABOUT THIS REPORT

The reporting period for this version of the report is the 2nd half of the 2024-25 financial year (1 January – 30 June 2025).

The following report provides trend data in three areas:

- > demographics
- > safety and security
- > programs, education, and community engagement.

NOTE ABOUT THE DATA

Data in this report is presented in financial years, from 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2025.

Data presented in the Bimberi Headline Indicators Report are unpublished data that can be updated or change between reporting periods. Caution should be exercised when using and interpreting data in this report, comparing between reporting periods or comparing to other published data.

The data presented represents a small number of young people in the population, and any changes in trend should be interpreted with caution.

Counting Rules

Age groups in this table are calculated from the age of each young person at the start of their period of detention, or if their period of detention commenced before the start of the quarter, on the first day of the quarter.

Note: Where a young person is in Bimberi over a birthday, this may result in them being reported in the higher classification in the next period.

Data Caveats

A young person may choose not to disclose their cultural identity.

Where there is an unknown Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander status, these young people have been included in the non-Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander disaggregation.

This may result in slightly different totals when compared with other tables that do not have age group categories.

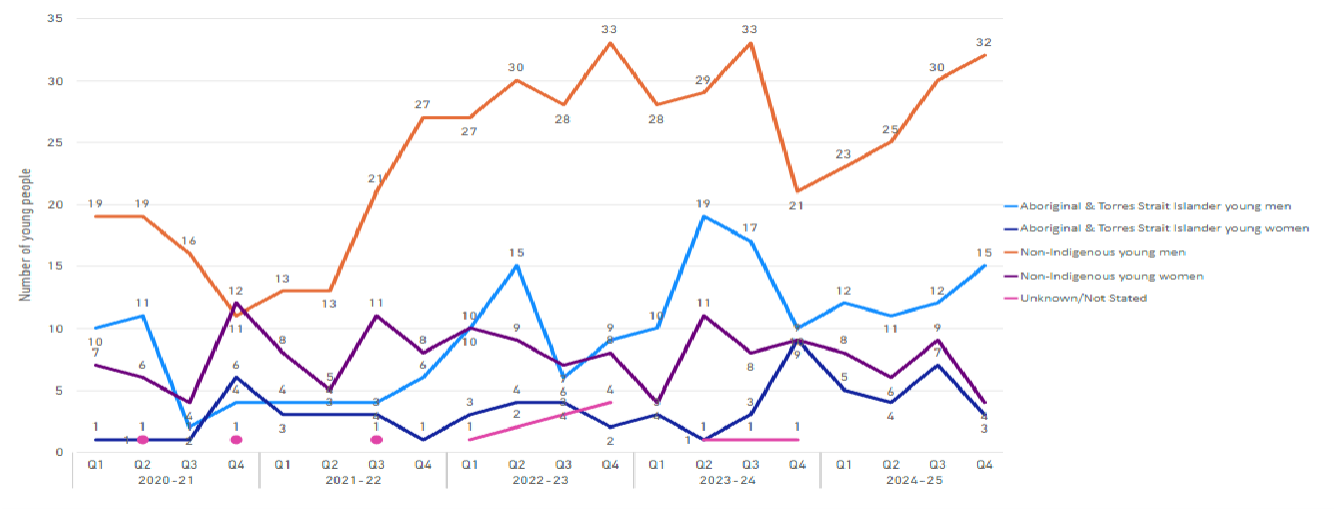

NUMBER OF YOUNG PEOPLE ON AN AVERAGE DAY

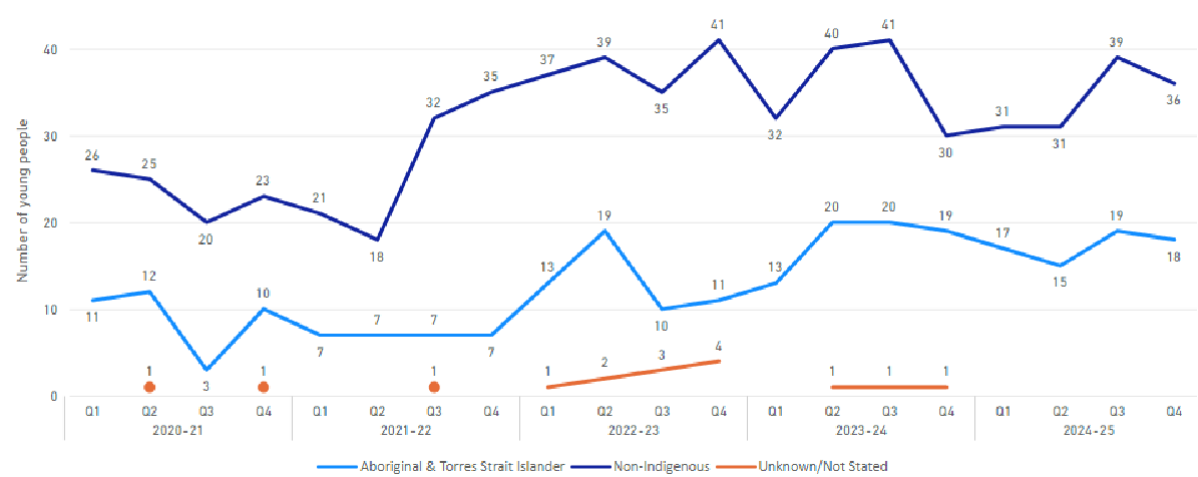

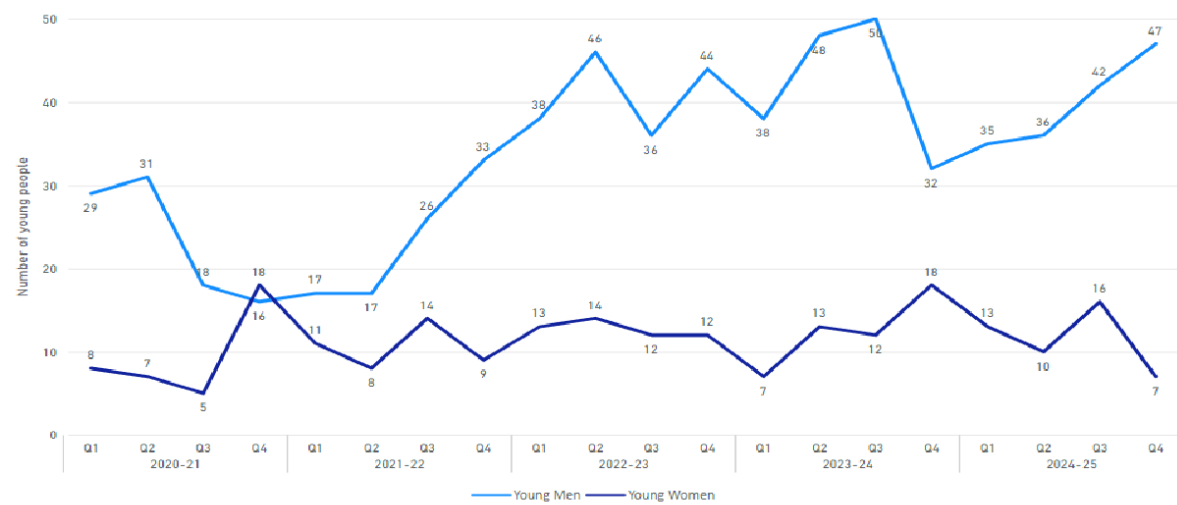

SAFETY AND SECURITY

Bimberi is a highly regulated environment with strict protocols and procedures in place to ensure the safety and wellbeing of young people. This includes internal review of every incident within the Centre to inform the ongoing management of young people in custody and ongoing improvements to the operations of the Centre. Young people in Bimberi often have multiple and complex needs, these can include drug and alcohol, mental health concerns and/or a trauma background that has resulted in difficulty regulating their behaviour when they get stressed or angry. Bimberi operates within a legislative and policy framework that prioritises the best interests of the young person.

INCIDENTS

All incidents are recorded in a register which is overseen by the ACT Public Advocate. Incidents are recorded under two categories:

- Category one incidents are defined as all serious incidents where the Executive Branch Manager is to be notified immediately. This includes but is not limited to attempted suicide, serious injury, serious health complaint, escape and serious assault.
- Category two incidents are defined as all other incidents such as contagious disease, minor breach of security, assault, fights, significant disturbance to the Centre, and incidents involving visitors to Bimberi, among other things.

ASSAULTS AND USE OF FORCE

Assault is defined in the ACT as an intentional act of direct infliction of force or violence. Use of Force is a physical effort applied by one person to another person to reduce an immediate risk to safety and/or security of the person to which force is being applied. Use of Force includes body contact and the use of instruments of physical restraint. The amount of physical effort applied (or 'force') must be the minimum necessary and reasonable to reduce the immediate risk to safety and/or security and achieve the purpose of which the force is being used.

Use of force also includes mechanical restraints for the purposes of escorted leave. For 2024/25, 56 of the 197 were mechanical restraints used during compliant Use of Force (i.e. escorted leave).

DRUG SCREENS

Young detainees and young people on long-term remand orders can be subject to periodic drug screening. Young people who have only recently been admitted to the Centre may present with symptoms of recent drug use which may be evident within drug tests.

SEARCHES ON INDUCTION

Searches on induction are undertaken to prevent prohibited items from entering Bimberi. These items may pose a risk to a young person, other young people, other people or staff at Bimberi. Searches contribute to the objective of keeping young people and all people who work at or visit Bimberi safe. Strip searching is only undertaken as a last resort following an assessment of risk being present following an ordinary frisk or scanning search.

OPERATIONAL LOCKDOWNS

Operational lockdowns occur for the minimum amount of time possible to ensure the safe operation of the centre, and they occur on a rotational basis. This means an individual young person will be in their room for half of the total lockdown period, generally in one or two-hour blocks of time.

Operational lockdowns occur when a decision has been made to secure all or some young people in their rooms for a period to manage resources and the safety and security of Bimberi. An operational lockdown does not include where a young person is secured in their room to enable staff to respond to the enactment of an emergency procedure. While in their rooms, young people have access to television including movies, reading and educational material.

*For several months during the 2019-20 financial year, Bimberi experienced extensive staffing shortages which is reflected in the increase in lockdowns during this period. These shortages were exacerbated by unpredictable staff availability due to unplanned personal leave, the unprecedented bushfire season, and COVID-19 restrictions

**The increase in lockdowns in 2021-22 was a result of COVID-19 impacts on the operations of the centre and staffing capacity.

*** The increase in lockdowns in 2024-25 is in part due to a significant increase in young people entering Bimberi in the second half of the 2024-25 financial year, resulting in operational staffing pressures.

SEGREGATION DIRECTIONS

The separation of young people from other young people in the ACT is known as 'segregation'. The decision to issue a segregation direction is not taken lightly and can only be authorised by a member of the Senior Management team.

Segregation involves restricting a young person's contact with other detainees, or access to particular parts of Bimberi and participation in Bimberi's everyday routines. Segregation is only used to ensure the safety of a young person, the safety of other young people and the safety of staff from injury and harm.

Segregation is not used as a behaviour management response, or for administrative reasons (e.g. staff shortages). Segregation is not solitary confinement. The ACT does not use what other jurisdictions might define as 'isolation' or 'confinement'.

TRANSFERS TO ALEXANDER MACONOCHIE CENTRE

Young people detained at Bimberi can be transferred to an adult correctional facility, such as Alexander Maconochie Centre (AMC) under the following circumstances; a young person detained at Bimberi on an order taking them past their 21st birthday must be transferred prior to their 21st birthday; and a young person aged 18 years to 20 years may be transferred if the transfer is deemed in their best interests or in the best interests of other young people in custody at Bimberi.

A determination to transfer a young person is undertaken in consultation with the young person, all services currently involved with the young person, the Alexander Maconochie Centre, and the young person's nominated person-guardian or carer.

PROGRAMS, EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

All young people at Bimberi are encouraged to participate in an educational program. These programs include units such as the Year 10 and 12 certificates, horticulture, hospitality, business, asbestos awareness, and introduction to Information Technology.

A range of programs and services are delivered to address the diverse needs and interests of young people in Bimberi. These programs and services help young people to develop strong links to their family and community whilst assisting with their transition from custody.

OCCASIONS OF LEAVE

Young people in custody can undertake approved leave from Bimberi for various purposes. It can be escorted-supervised, semi-supervised or unsupervised. All leave is risk assessed prior to approval.

Approved leave can be undertaken for a variety of reasons such as health appointments, work experience, family outings, meetings with supporting services such as ACT Housing, and compassionate leave (e.g. to attend a funeral).

VISITS

Visitation provides the opportunity to build and maintain family ties and develop the living skills young people need to reintegrate successfully in the community.

The ACT Public Advocate and Official Visitors maintain oversight of Bimberi which includes regular visits to Bimberi and young people at Bimberi can call them at any time. The ACT Public Advocate is required to inspect Bimberi registers including searches, use of force, and segregation at Bimberi.
